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NATURAL BEAUTY & OUTDOOR ACTIVITIES

Cyprus stuns with its spectacular landscapes - from sea-carved cliffs to cool pine forests and hidden waterfalls. It's the kind of place where nature feels close enough to touch.

Outdoor exploration here means venturing through the wild beauty of places like Cape Greco's sea caves or the rugged trails of the Akamas Peninsula, home to rare flora and sweeping coastal views. The island's mountainous heart, the Troodos range, offers hiking trails and cycling paths shaded by towering trees, leading to natural treasures like Caledonia and Millomeris waterfalls.

For a more adrenaline-filled escape, hop into a Jeep safari through untouched countryside, where you'll discover remote monasteries and charming villages nestled among dramatic valleys.

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ENCHANTING VILLAGES

Cypriot villages are filled with charm and history, offering a tranquil retreat. Scattered across the island - especially in the breathtaking Troodos Mountain range - these rural gems showcase spectacular scenery and panoramic views. Wander through winding cobblestone streets lined with traditionally styled homes and hidden courtyards. Explore

the delicate arts of lace embroidery and filigree silverwork, visit ancient olive mills, or marvel at a centuries-old medieval wine press still standing proudly in the heart of village life. Experience local festivals with cultural and religious significance, and discover cosy shops selling traditional handmade sweets and artisanal crafts.

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WINE ROUTES

HISTORY & CULTURE

Many of Cyprus's most treasured sites are honoured on UNESCO's World Heritage list.

Cyprus today is a living museum, home to Greek temples, Roman amphitheatres, Byzantine monasteries, Gothic cathedrals, Venetian walls, and numerous other precious historic monuments, all coexisting within its landscape. Rural villages still nurture traditional ways of life, while museums and galleries preserve and showcase the island's evolving identity.

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A TRAVELLER'S GUIDE TO CYPRUS

CYPRUS WEATHER

Cyprus enjoys a Mediterranean climate characterised by hot, dry summers and mild, rainy winters. Summer lasts from mid-May to mid-October, while winter spans from November to mid-March. Temperatures can soar above 30°C during the summer months, accompanied by long hours of sunshine. Winters are mild, with possible rainfall, and snow is limited to the Troodos Mountains. Cyprus boasts a high number of sunny days, with an average of 300 to 340 sunny days per year.

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ENTRY VISA REQUIREMENT

An entry visa is required for foreign nationals wishing to visit the Republic of Cyprus, whether for a short stay (under 90 days) or an extended visit (up to one year). While Cyprus is not part of the Schengen Area, travellers holding a valid and active Schengen visa may be permitted entry for short visits without requiring a separate Cypriot visa. However, those without a Schengen visa must apply directly for a Cyprus visa before their trip.

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LANGUAGES & RELIGION

The official languages of the Republic of Cyprus are Greek and Turkish, with English widely spoken across the island. In addition, French, German, and Russian are commonly used within the tourism sector. Cyprus upholds a strong tradition of religious freedom. The majority of Greek-Cypriots are members of the Greek Orthodox Church, while the Turkish-Cypriot community is predominantly Muslim. The island is also home to other religious groups, including Armenians, Maronites, and Roman Catholics.

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GETTING AROUND CYPRUS

Urban and intercity buses operate within towns and link various districts, running frequently during the daytime. In popular tourist areas, routes are often extended into the evening during summer months to accommodate visitors. Alongside walking and cycling, travellers can explore the island by taxi or rental car for greater flexibility and ease.

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MONEY & CURRENCY

The Republic of Cyprus is a high-income, developed member state of the European Union and uses the euro as its official currency. Credit cards are broadly accepted across the island, making payments easy and convenient at most shops, restaurants, and services. Tipping is optional and entirely at the customer's discretion. That said, it is a kind gesture that is always warmly received by taxi drivers, hotel staff, and employees in cafés and restaurants.
